New Birding Trail to Open This Fall

BCCDKY is working with The Boone Conservancy and



Boone County Parks to develop the Lee McNeely Birding Trail at Conservancy Park in Belleview. Lee McNeely was a long time Boone County resident who shared his passion for birding and love of nature through his volunteer work with the Northern Kentucky Bird Club and the Kentucky Ornithological Society. The trail is a memorial gift from the Heritage Bank to The Boone Conservancy.

The new trail, which is due to be completed in November, will extend the existing loop around Conservancy pond and lead hikers through a variety of bird habitats, such as forest, wetland, and meadow. Birds such as herons, warblers, owls, and so many more can be seen in these areas. A full list of birds sighted in the area can be seen on ebird.com.

Feel free to visit Conservancy Park, open daily from dawn until dusk, and stay tuned to learn when the trail is complete!
